A MESSAGE

FROM MARILYN & TINA

"Never let the fear of striking out keep you from playing the game." - Babe Ruth.

This is one of many motivational expressions used since early 2020 that has helped us to learn, grow and change tactics while staying focused on our mission to support the needs of children, youth and families served by the Halton Children's Aid Society.

By far, the most compelling motivator is hearing the words of youth who have benefitted from the generous donations received from amazing supporters; "I am so incredibly grateful for everything the agency has done for me over the last few years. Your support saved me from countless sleepless nights, hungry mornings and many panic attacks."

As a small charity with the very big responsibility of funding life-saving and life-changing programs and activities, we compete with literally thousands of other fundraising entities. Moving to an on-line, virtual world has increased the competition and it's more important than ever to engage with donors, tell the stories, and provide proof of a sound investment. We are also very aware that donors are bombarded with requests for help and so we are immensely grateful when people show support through contributions of various types and all sizes. Especially as, due to the level of confidentiality to which we are bound, we can't provide names or arrange meetings or visits like many other charities can, and therefore the element of trust is even stronger. We can't begin to express the depth of gratitude we have for that kind of faith and commitment.

It seems that each year we have something huge to report on. This year was a record one...we sold a property! For more than thirty years CAFH has owned residences that have been used as emergency placements and homes to teenagers in transition. Thankfully, the need for group homes has decreased significantly, with more nurturing family settings available in Halton. So we waited, took advantage of the real estate market's peak selling period and timed the sale perfectly! Some of these funds were used to make a significant annual contribution to the Halton Children's Aid Society which were directed in support of older youth who have been particularly challenged by the pandemic as they age out of care. The rest of the proceeds were added to our investment portfolio, ensuring funds are available to cover operational activities and sustain the support of the most vulnerable young people in this community.

Throughout Halton there are approximately 5,000 children and youth who require the assistance of the Halton Children's Aid Society. For many of those the support CAFH provides is the difference between surviving and thriving. So, in keeping with Halton CAS's theme "Providing the Wings for Our Youth to Soar" we, together with you our donors and supporters, are indeed providing the wind beneath those wings....(you're singing it aren't you \(\begin{align*} \omega \\ \omega \end{align*}).

OUR PROGRAMS



Bursaries and Education

We believe education is the key to breaking the cycle of poverty and abuse; increasing a child's self-esteem, confidence, and ability to succeed. Since post-secondary education is not funded by the government, our youth in care rely on the Halton Children's Aid Society to pay for any post high-school education that might benefit them. Education is the first step towards a brighter future and we work together with the CAS to make educational opportunities available to all youth in care helped by the Society. Whatever the child/youth has a passion for, that their worker feels is an attainable goal, will be strongly encouraged by our Bursary committee and funded by the CAFH.



Sports and Recreation

We believe all children and youth should have the chance to run, skate, ride a bicycle, paint, learn a new activity, or simply have the chance to interact with other children and youth their age. We know from experience that encouraging children and youth to participate in organized sports and recreational activities enables them to develop important life skills, self-esteem and confidence. We provide funds and in-kind gifts to ensure children have the chance to be children and create happy childhood memories with friends and mentors.



FUTURES

The goal of the FUTURES Educational Program is to help youth receiving services from the Halton Children's Aid Society achieve their educational goals and support them as they transition into adulthood. Youth meet weekly to participate in a project-based learning series, working in teams to develop critical thinking and problem solving skills, communication, social skills, academic learning, cultural awareness and life skills. FUTURES also runs a summer camp. The school year and summer camp programs are divided into junior and senior divisions. During the school year, the program runs weekly and the summer camp program runs for three weeks for each division. These are memories that last forever and are experiences we want to offer children who can't imagine this fun. Emotional trauma, anxiety or other challenges often preclude them from being accepted into 'regular' summer camps so we fundraise to ensure our camp will accommodate these strong and active children and youth who need the chance to experience some real joy.



Youth in Care

Our Youth in Care are the future of this community; the Halton CAS and CAFH must act as their parents. We fund a Life Skills program to help connect these youth to their community and better prepare them for adult life. Preparing for issues such as applying to university; budgeting; peer pressure; healthy nutrition; first aid and more; individually or in group settings with volunteers acting as mentors, the youth are encouraged to reach for their dreams and set out on the path to success. The success of this program is helping to keep our youth in school and assisting them to overcome their emotional issues in order to graduate from high school, look towards a fresh start and a brighter future. No one needs hope more than our youth, and youth who have experienced abuse and neglect need that hope more than ever. We've learned that introducing youth to this program in their early teens helps them through a very vulnerable time in their lives and guides them to find the hope they need.

OUR PROGRAMS



DREAMS Begin at home

This program became an essential source of support during the pandemic lockdown and recovery. Beds, Life-Start Kits and Comfort Kits, are provided to children and youth in need. A Life-Start Kit consists of essential household items, all that a youth might need to set up home independently. Comfort Kits are issued to a child or youth who has come into care or is moving to a new placement. Kits have pjs, socks, personal hygiene products, a book, etc which help in the transition. A complete bed, with mattress and box spring bring a good night's sleep and with it the ability to focus on school and a secure future. The impact is immeasurable.



Bridging the Gap

Bridging the Gap is an independent community program that supports and assists youth between the ages of 16 to 24 years of age who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. The program is voluntary and based on client needs. It is focused on supporting and assisting youth in obtaining housing. This may include shelter placements, supportive and transitional housing. Bridging the Gap serves an average of 500 youth annually in the Halton Region.



Seasonal Program

The Seasonal Program is not just about gifts under the tree, but also supports graduation, back to school needs, Thanksgiving celebrations, etc; all the things we do year round that we often take for granted. The Halton CAS assists children and youth who have experienced significant family trauma as well as families that have serious challenges with limited resources and are unable to provide their children/youth with basic needs and gifts over the holiday season.





Emily - Elizabeth Interiors Award for Excellence


Emily is 22 years old and is enrolled in her 5th year of a 6 year Concurrent Education Program through Lakehead University in Thunder Bay, Ontario.
